In March 2023, Concordia broke ground on a major project for the future of Christian education in Northwest Omaha. Thrive launched even before Forward With Faith wrapped up. The timing was necessitated by the need to relocate Concordia Academy. But this is much more than a project of cement and drywall. This endeavor is an extension of God's work. God's perfect timing asks only that we commit our time, prayer, and resources to a faithful expression of the Kingdom of God at work.

Thrive is about Deeper Roots: We know that God's love impacts his people. His love is the heart of Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha. Thrive is about a Wider Reach: We have the opportunity to partner more broadly with families, friends, ministries, and the community in order to carry out Concordia's mission and vision. Thrive exemplifies God's Perfect Timing: 14 additional classrooms, a 700+ seat worship and performing arts center, a unified K-12 campus, a dedicated Academy entrance, and a campus prepared for future facility needs. These are part of God's plan for this time at Concordia.

All of this positions Concordia to further explore sustainable growth of programming and find exciting ways to deepen our commitment to personalized learning focused on the whole child. These efforts to deepen our commitment to faith-based learning are made possible by completing Thrive.

THE MAY TELL YOU ABOUT HER FAVORITE SCHOOL IF YOU ARE BLESSED ENOUGH TO MEET MEAGAN RASMUSSEN. A K-12 attendee of Concordia, Meagan says, "I love Concordia! The Lord really knew what He had in mind with this place. I saw so many people mentored and discipled to. The Lord saved my life multiple times by being at Concordia."

Feeling known, and not just her name, but known as a person, is what made the difference for Meagan. "I feel like the staff just knew me, and they knew my friends too. The staff was like family, which helped me excel and be my best self," explains Meagan. "Mr. Staub, Mr. Kulus, Mrs. Lee – any of them could look at me and know that it wasn't my day and give me grace while still making me get work done." Knowing that she could go to teachers and that their doors were always open was comforting and helpful to Meagan during her high school years. Having that relationship with the staff made Meagan recognize her desire to attend a smaller Christian college, "I wanted to keep that. It was really special."

After graduating from Concordia in 2017, Meagan turned to a small Christian college to earn the nursing degree she always knew she wanted. "It was a little disappointing. It didn't feel that Christian to me. igot so used to something incredibly special at Concordia, and it just wasn't the same," says Meagan.

Her college experience may not have been like high school at Concordia, but she was ready. Meagan was prepared for her time in

college through AP courses she took in high school, volleyball, One Act, and musicals, "We could do really well or really poorly; not only did that prepare me emotionally for life, but the purpose of whatever we did always came back to us glorifying God. I knew how to study and how to learn. I do really feel like Concordia makes students Kingdom Ready, but also educationally ready."

Meagan has put her education into practice as a pediatric oncology and hematology nurse at Sanford Children's Hospital in Sioux Falls, SD. She acknowledges that it is incredibly difficult to deal with children in horrible situations, but it is an easy role to fill, knowing that it is where the Lord has placed her. "I don't always get to talk about religion, but I know the Lord uses me in how I greet them or how I sing off-key for them, and those actions show His love, joy, and goodness," Meagan explains.

Being able to show God's love was taught to Meagan at home through her parents. "I feel extra blessed to have parents who know the Lord 👱 the way they do, to instill those beliefs at home, and then to go to school to grow deeper in those beliefs five days a week; I think there's credit o due to my homelife there as well." Meagan's father, Rev. Jim Rasmussen, is the Associate Pastor and Director of Discipleship at Divine Shepherd Lutheran Church in Millard, and her Mother, Nanette, serves on the Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha School Board.

It is clear that Meagan trusts the Lord's will for her, "Time and time again, the Lord is so good. I'm thankful for all He has carried me through and led me to do. And I'll continue to trust that "he who promised is faithful." -Hebrews 10:23" she says, with joy in her heart.

paid. "Occasionally, she would pick them up from school and mentor them," recalls Bill. When Bill retired from the Omaha World-Herald in 2004, it was a practice that a gift from fellow executives would be made to the retiree. Former gifts to retirees were typically golf-related, such as equipment, rounds of golf at a prestigious golf course, etc. Since Bill did not play golf, counsel was sought from Leona for an appropriate gift. Her suggestion was that Bill would appreciate a gift to the Wider Omaha Lutheran Schools Association, now Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha. It was soon announced in the April 2004 School's newsletter that six executives and their spouses from the Omaha World-Herald had made a significant gift to Concordia. A retirement gift in Kernen's honor began Bill and Leona's lifetime of service to others. Philanthropy in the Kernen family started with Leona. "She was the executive director of our checkbook,"

says Bill, "the job was to identify who, then for what, and then how much. From that process, we developed a Philanthropy Policy." Out of that policy came a list of the top priorities for Kernen's giving, which is prioritized into five categories. The first is the mission of the charity, which embraces the Great Commission from Matthew 28:16-20 NIV. Second is Education, third is Social Welfare, next the Arts, and then Community Efforts. Of special note is that education or social welfare institutions embracing the Great Commission move to the number one priority, which includes Schools like Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha and

Leona had a vision, and Bill has carried that through in her memory beautifully with the establishment of a private foundation with the Board of Directors, including their children, Kerry, Jonathan, Marcia, and Philip, along with advisor George Wachtler and Executive Director Michele Pohlman by his side.

In 2000, during the campaign to convert the horse barn into a high school building, some donors indicated they would like to make a gift to a WOLSA endowment fund. The Chair, Pastor Block, of the school Board of Directors at the time, asked Bill, along with some others, to make a recommendation as to whether a Foundation should be created or whether the school should own the fund. The team recommended a Foundation, Bill chaired the foundation's Board of Directors from its creation until 2022 when Gaye Lynn Shaffart was elected chair.



COLLABORATION. EXPERIMENTATION. PERSISTENCE

Collaboration between Concordia's Sr. High and Academy is an exciting new learning opportunity available now that all grade levels are on the same campus. Since 2016, Mrs. Senechal's 4th-grade class has participated in The Hour of Code, a worldwide initiative that began in 2013 to promote computer science. Students begin by learning about careers involving coding, then work through a coding tutorial, followed by activities on the code.org website. "I love that our students learn coding in Academy because of the many ways it develops logical thinking problem-solving skills, and fosters creativity," says Mr. Cooksey.

To add depth and more advanced experience to the coding lessons, Mrs. Senechal collaborated with Mr. Mueller, the High School Robotics coach. Mr. Mueller and his students showed examples of text-based code they created, then demonstrated how those codes give directions for the robots they built for competitions. "Seeing the text code on the screen was really cool!" said Josh M and Charles E, both fourth-graders.

Three of Mrs. Senechal's students shared what they learned about two different types of coding: block coding from Hour of Code and text coding from Mr. Mueller's class. Charles E. discussed the understanding that there are different types of coding and the fact that it takes a long time to enter text coding. "To be a good text coder, you must be good at typing," Charles noted. Buth S learned she would enjoy a coding job someday, while Charles believes he would like to become a game developer. "Watching them collaborate" was what Josh M enjoyed the most from the experience.

Collaboration is, indeed, an instrumental part of success in Mr. Mueller's class. Working in teams, sharing, and implementing ideas can be the key to making the robots work. During the fourth-graders visit to the Senior High Robotics classroom, Adam S, Thomas P, Eli D, and Noah L showcased autonomous code by highlighting a section they were most proud of and explaining the purpose of the code to their Academy visitors.

In Concordia Robotics Club, a new game is released each year, and club members build and program custom robots for the game. Teams put in hundreds of hours building and perfecting their robots with the goal of state and world competitions in mind. Academy students learned from the demonstration that each match played is divided into two periods; autonomous and driver-controlled. In the autonomous period, the robots drive themselves based on a program created by the students.

"During one demonstration, the robot failed two times, but the third time, it worked flawlessly," shares Mr. Mueller, "This demonstrated the need for persistence in computer programming because things don't usually work the first time. It takes constant testing and adapting to make a final product work correctly."

Collaboration between classmates and classrooms is common at Concordia. Academy students are seeing how the lessons they learn in their classrooms now will be used in the coming years in more complex ways for classroom projects and extracurricular activities. Students who find topics of study exceptionally appealing are now seeing how they can lead to career options and are encouraged to explore those opportunities as they grow and develop as learners.

Shawn and Liz Cook knew Concordia existed. They live only a stone's throw away, but attending the school wasn't part of the plan for their three boys. They attended public school until COVID hit in 2020, and then Concordia became something they looked into. Both Liz and Shawn were working from home and needed consistent, in-person education for the boys. "We are nearby, and my parents had heard good things about Concordia and told us we needed to make a decision," says Liz. Because Concordia was still holding in-person classes when many public schools were doing online courses, the Cook family, like many others, found themselves considering Concordia.

Not only had they heard good things and lived close to the school, but Shawn and Liz are friends with Lee and Jennifer Handke. Lee is a former school board member and Jennifer is the current Jr.–Sr. High Art Teacher. "We very much trust them; they are one of the reasons we were very comfortable with moving schools and joining the Concordia community."

The biggest reason the Cook family has stayed is community. "The boys are part of something bigger than themselves," share the Cooks. "We've had a really good connection to other parents and families through the sports events and activities." Taking advantage of the opportunities to do all the activities that Concordia has to offer is something Liz and Shawn both love about their boys being at the school. "It is important to have life experiences, whether it's crosscountry when you never thought you could run that far, or trying out for a musical when you didn't believe you could get up in front of everyone and sing and dance," shares Liz.

Life experiences also included baptism for the boys during their first year at Concordia. Evan, Nathan, and Ryan were in 7th, 5th, and 3rd grades that year. "We really like the connection Pr. Staub has with all the kids. Concordia felt like the perfect place to have them baptized,"


said Liz. After much discussion and making the boys one another's accountability partners in the process, the three boys were baptized during an all-school chapel. It was an incredible experience for the entire school to witness the three boys being baptized together. All of the boys' grandparents attended, Evan's friends were excited for him, and students cheered for them. Now a 9th grader, Evan recognizes this as an incredibly important moment in his life: "Being brought into the kingdom just felt better."

As Evan transitioned from middle to high school last fall, Shawn and Liz offered him options regarding what school he wished to attend. He toured Central, Skutt, and Westview, all with the purpose of determining where Evan felt he could excel. "Evan said he didn't feel he had a "place" in other locations – that says to me that he feels he has a place at Concordia, both with his teachers and his friends. He is part of a community." When Evan tells you why he chose to stay at Concordia, he's clear and concise. "I like Concordia because friends feel more like family. I can relate to most of my teachers, and getting the classes I want is easy. Colleges come in, the military comes in, and it's nice to see a lot of options offered regularly. And Pr. Staub is very inspirational. He doesn't care who you are, he just wants you to be closer to Jesus."

Shawn notes that the class sizes are important to him and Liz when making the decision to keep the boys at Concordia. "Students are not being pigeonholed, and everyone rallies around you, whatever you do." Evan, Nathan, and Ryan participate in many activities, including One Act, Cross Country, Musicals, Choir, Baseball, and Basketball. Shawn and Liz share, "Evan picked Concordia because he can be a part of things: friend groups, failures, successes, learning, and it ultimately leads you to be more prepared for life."



The mission of Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha is to equip students who are Faith Secure, World Ready, Kingdom Leaders. Shawn and Liz believe that mission is being fulfilled in their boys and are happy to see them staying at Concordia with their friends who are like family, and the community in which they feel they belong.



S A MISSIOLOGY CLASS, the objective is to put into practice our most important mission: to share the love of God with our neighbor. When Mrs. Audry Sado took her Missiology students on a first-time trip to St. Louis in the fall of 2023, she was very impressed with them. "When students are in a classroom, they keep a bit more to themselves. When you get them out, they love to interact, and they work really hard," says Sado.

Sharing the love of God with others was something they learned about from other missionaries. The group met with Dr. Rich Rudowske, executive director of Lutheran Bible Translators. He shared the organization's mission to translate the Bible into approximately 4,000 languages for people who do not have the Bible in their mother tongue. Louisa Lehenbauer, Director of Concordia Mission Institute and former missionary, emphasized the importance of communication and relationships through fun activities and a Bible message about Paul and his missionary journeys in Rome.

In St. Louis, they put what they learned into practice at Holy Cross Lutheran Church by buddying up with students in their after-school program. The church had converted an old seminary building into an art institute in order to serve their neighborhood needs. "Holy Cross is in an area of town that is very much transitional, and the students

cleaned an adjacent parking lot and filled three huge dumpsters full of trash, broken glass, weeds, and trash. The church appreciated the help making the parking lot so much more enjoyable and appealing to the attendees for the festival they were holding the next weekend," shared Sado.

They also served the Concordia Historical Institute by sweeping, vacuuming, and organizing rooms that needed attention. Sado commented on how hard the students worked and how much they enjoyed their time in service to others. "They were only asked to sweep and vacuum, but they reorganized the entire room!"

hat does a One Act director do when he knows his next cast will have one male and umpteen females? He gives himself creative license by writing the next script. In 2022, when Mr. Chase Winter knew the One Act cast would include only one male and many females, he knew it was time to put his writing skills to work and create a script customized for his unique cast. After a wildly successful 2022 season with As You Bid's cast and a reminder that working with a self-written script provides freedom not found otherwise, Winter again embarked on the script-writing journey for the 2023 season.

Winter finds himself most productive at One Act script writing during the summer break. The process begins with brainstorming in May and June, and once July hits, the actual writing process begins, with edits continuing until days before auditions. Total writing time takes at least 20 hours, and changes occur weeks into rehearsals. "That's the great thing about writing your own script; you can change it as needed," claims Winter.

Change it they did. Two weeks into rehearsals, the name of the 2023 One Act play changed from *Trouble in Tecoma* to *Wrong Way from Santa Fe*. This cast and crew didn't go the wrong way to state, though. They collected first-place finishes at the Conference, Midland One

Act Clash, and District competitions and placed second at the State competition. Praise from a Midland One Act Clash judge declared it the "least high school looking show" she'd seen, noting that the cast did not carry themselves like high school students. It is a compliment Winter takes to heart for his cast and crew, "I know the hard work the kids put in and the frustrations that come with a script that can change and letting them make decisions when they want me to make decisions for them. The students know what is expected, and they know how to do theatre well."

Setting high standards was instilled in the program early on with former One Act director Mrs. Lori Dillon (then, Lori Plummer). "We owe a lot of our success to her. She set a really great groundwork and created the culture that this is a serious, professional group while still in high school and having fun." Winter says of Dillon, founder of Concordia's One Act team. Winter knows he has a high standard to uphold, saying, "Our goal is to glorify God in competition."

The cast and crew of *Wrong Way from Santa Fe* proudly honored the Concordia Theatre program traditions and utilized their talent fully each time they performed. Of these things, Mr. Winter is especially grateful and proud.
