CONSTRUCTION AND RENOVATION TIMELINE AT-A-GLANCE

- Concordia was informed by St. Mark Lutheran Church that they would launch their own school and that the Concordia Academy lease would not be renewed after June 2023.
- Planning commenced immediately with the Board of Directors and a large constituent group.
- Constituent group input led the Board to understand that a unified K-12 campus was both the long-term vision and the preferred choice of the constituents.
- Concordia finalized their primary renovation and construction partners through a bid and interview process. BCDM architects and Meco-Henne Construction were selected. Other partners included Lamp Rynearson and Morrissey Engineering.
- Concordia learned during the preliminary design process that a FEMA approved storm shelter would be required. This space is now named The Nancy Griffith Worship and Performing Arts Center.
- From mid-May through July of 2023 the school offices and Auxiliary gym worship stage were renovated to classroom spaces to provide for the needs of Concordia Academy. The project took just 78 days from start to finish...quite an accomplishment!
- July 2024 is the planned completion of the external road system, four additional classrooms, school office area, and The Nancy Griffith Worship and Performing Arts Center. The project is considered on time.

LEVEN ALUMNI CHILDREN ARE ENROLLED AT CONCORDIA THIS YEAR. As a relatively young school, opening less than 30 years ago, Concordia is beginning to see legacy students arrive. Matt & Kate (Hannemann) Mueller are an alumni couple with two children enrolled, and a third starting in the fall of 2024. Alumni children are enrolled for a variety of reasons, but the Mueller family has a story all their own.

When Kate (Hannemann) Mueller arrived at Concordia in 2008 for her Senior year it was where she wanted to be. "I went to public school before coming to Omaha and it turned out that my community was my church. When we arrived here, attending a Lutheran school was my priority," explains Kate. And the community she was expecting was right there waiting for her. "It was instant family. I was immediately connected with friends and activities."

2008 was the year of the inaugural Niobrara senior retreat, which Kate found to be a fun way to connect with classmates and teachers. She also recalls there weren't lights on the football field, so games were

played early and a tradition became to go to the Hannemann's house afterward began. The days of dodgeball tournaments are also fresh in her memory, "and let me tell you, Marty Senechal totally cheated!"

Those memories are full of value and joy, but what holds deep meaning for Kate is what she found in her relationships. "Mrs. Lee did my Senior Blessing. We had a special connection as she was willing to talk about faith with me," shares Kate. She was also blessed to have Mrs. Gail Klemp overseeing her study hall. Kate went on to Concordia University in Seward, NE and earned her degree in Elementary Education with a K-12 Special Education Endorsement.

Since then, Kate has always told Mrs. Klemp, "Save me a seat; you know I'm coming!" As of the fall of 2023, the dream team of Mrs. Klemp and Mrs. Mueller has been side-by-side, serving students in the Academic Success Center. Of their partnership, Mrs. Klemp shares, "Working with Kate has been an answer to my prayers. It has been a trail-blazing year learning how to navigate the logistics of having a Special Education teacher on our campus, but I love that I am experiencing it with Kate! We work very well together and it has been a blessing to have someone in the Academic Success Center with a Lutheran Education background."

Being back in the hallways of Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha offers a myriad of benefits to Kate. "It's fun being in the hallways where I met my husband and he asked me to prom," she notes, "but more importantly, it's a blessing to see my kids in the hall and give them a quick hug. Seeing their friends' parents serving lunch, leading chapel, and being leaders in our school community is so huge."

Knowing that Concordia is now old enough for the children of alumni to attend, it offers the opportunity to ask how their own experience influenced that decision. "Christian education prepared me to raise more Kingdom Leaders in my own kids. We wanted to have a relationship with our children's teachers, to know who they are, and what they believe in," shares Kate. "Our kids have a system of adult Christians they can go to in order to ask hard questions, and I trust those people are going to lead them in the right direction and the truth."

That's how Lori Gedwillo describes Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha. In an hour of time shared with this couple one will come to realize how deeply dedicated they are to Concordia and Lutheran Education as a whole.

Steve Gedwillo was born the youngest, by far, of six children, and his father was a Lutheran pastor who passed away when Steve was only five years old. All his siblings attended public school, and his two oldest sisters were very interested in where he would be sent to school. Both of those sisters attended Concordia colleges, where they met their husbands, who went on to become Lutheran school principals. "One of the best things that happened in my life was my sisters and their husbands persuading my mom to send me to a private Lutheran school. I attended St. Paul's in Sioux City. The

principal was my brother-in-law's cousin, and his wife was my first-grade teacher," shares Steve. These events were a game-changer in Steve's life.

This was Steve's start as a lifelong fan of Lutheran Education. When he and Lori married, they moved to Omaha; after having children, they wanted a Lutheran education for them. They discovered that all the Lutheran schools at that time were on one end of town, the East end, opposite from where Steve and Lori lived. When the kids got to be school-age, they sent them to Mt. Calvary. "They were great. The kids loved it. We loved it. We just believed in it," says Steve.

Along with the Gedwillos were a group of like-minded Lutherans who were also driving across town to Mt. Calvary. Included in this group was Pr. Block from Divine Shepherd. Pr. Block initiated a prayer group regarding a school in West Omaha called West Omaha Lutheran Schools Study Group – WOLSSG.

With much excitement and joy Steve shares, "All those people were getting together, meeting regularly, and decided, 'we need to do this.' It was finally to the point where it was time to move so WOLSA became incorporated and hired Dave Mueller as the Executive Director. Dave is small in stature but a great big man of God who came in with the structure and organization to make it happen."

Gedwillo's four children and a daughter-in-law graduated from Concordia, and Steve and Lori share with delight, "We were amazed at seeing our kids be witnesses to Christ. They got to do all kinds of activities they maybe wouldn't have done in a public school. And they heard the word of God every day."

While the kids were involved in activities, Steve and Lori were busy too. Lori taught for 19 years, starting at Abundant Life in 1998 and continuing to move through the system and into Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha. Steve was on and off the Board of Directors over the years, served as a volunteer, and assisted with the football programs. "It was just one of the best things as parents to see our kids' faith develop," says Steve.

The faith development of students at Concordia is something the Gedwillos are still seeing. Their presence at activities, sports, the gala, and more is commonplace. The Gedwillow's involvement through continued gifts is the kind of generosity that comes from a deep passion and desire to be a part of something incredibly special. Members of the Concordia community like Steve and Lori are held near and dear to the heart. Steve explains, "My roots and affections in this are really deep. It's our job to train up the next generations in the word of God."







"There is no user's manual or rule book for parenting. As parents, we are doing the best we can. As I keep telling Mrs. Mueller, sending our kids to Concordia is the best decision we've ever made and the best money we've ever spent," says Molly Heng.

The fall of 2022 brought Molly and Jeff Heng and their children, Ayden now a 7th grader, and Peyton currently in 6th grade, to Concordia. The move was for the environment, to change the setting and the way the daily rhythms of life had settled for Peyton and Ayden in the public-school setting. What the Heng family found was a much deeper and more meaningful experience for their family than they had expected. "The teachers really, really care. I've had great conversations and feedback from them, and all of them watch out for the kids. Peyton and Ayden adore their teachers and it's been a great experience for both of them," shares Molly.

An unexpected experience came right away for Ayden when he joined his class in August on a trip to Camp Luther. Jeff joined as a chaperone and after that first group experience Molly says Ayden felt welcomed and accepted because of the actions of one of his classmates. Molly & Jeff shared that Ayden didn't even want to go on the trip, but at lunch one of the boys made sure he had a spot at the table and welcomed him as part of the class. This interaction may have been a turning point for Ayden as going to school before coming to Concordia was a struggle, but now he enjoys going and dislikes the idea of missing school.

Not to be dismissed are the changes in Peyton's faith and academics since joining the Concordia family. "She really enjoys going to worship, loves her discipleship class, and Mrs. Sado. "Peyton is always very positive when she comes to class and is eager to share what she's excited about. She looks forward to discipleship lessons,

especially on days when she gets to keep score for Bible trivia," says Mrs. Sado.

The turnaround in both of their educational abilities has been amazing," says Molly. "Concordia is an academically challenging school, and Peyton had always been behind in the classroom until she came to Concordia. She arrived almost three grade levels behind, yet now she's completely at grade level earning all As and Bs. Ayden has almost all straight A's," notes Molly. "There's a huge level of respect for everyone's roles. Concordia can be intimidating from the academic aspect, but without having what the public schools have as far as special education services, Concordia is blowing it out of the water. Mrs. Klemp and Mrs. Mueller are giving so much individual attention to students to help them thrive!"

Jeff and Molly are thankful for the Concordia community and the Academic Success Center where Ayden and Peyton meet with Mrs. Klemp and Mrs. Mueller each week. They discussed the organization as whole and their belief that Concordia is built from the top down. "We feel there is a welcoming feeling you get when you talk to anyone from Concordia, making it more than just a school but a community, and when you add in the environment and faith-base it becomes a family."

Since becoming part of the Concordia Family, Ayden and Peyton have participated in Faith in Action Day and Peyton is in Mr. Jipp's Growing Leaders class who went to Open Door Mission. She was so moved to learn how many children there are in Omaha's homeless community that she created her own fundraiser and filled the back of Jeff's truck with necessities and stuffed animals to donate. Molly and Jeff sum it all up perfectly, "You want your kids to grow up to be kind and caring, and the Concordia environment grows that."





AYDEN AND PEYTON ARE THRIVING AT CONCORDIA! - MOLLY HENG

NEOF THE THINGS I LOVE ABOUT CONCORDIA IS THAT WE CAN OFFER A WORSHIP ARTS CLASS THAT IS SO UNIQUE. Many organizations offer a rock band-style class, but it is rare for a worship arts class like this one to exist, even at the college level," explains Mrs. Hannah Nunnenkamp-Engelman. Throughout her 13 years of teaching, she has reached out to other worship artists and leaders, asking about their experiences. She discovered they don't have the same contemporary worship program as Concordia.

What Concordia Omaha is offering through the Worship Arts class is putting students on the radar for Concordia universities. "Even universities don't have that contemporary worship piece, and they see our kids with this experience and are impressed with what our kids can bring to their programs," shares Mrs. Engelman.

Leading weekly Prayer and Praise each Thursday gives the group experience in all aspects of group worship, including technology. "Cora F came in halfway through the year and did an amazing job of really making sure we were prepared with visuals and tech each week. Molly T really took ownership of the slides, uploading the songs, and creating graphics. Ryker J was independent in his entire setup. Seeing the kids grow this year and recognize what needed to be done before being asked was huge," shares Mrs. Engelman. Students can press into that even more next year in the new Nancy Griffith Worship & Performing Arts Center and learn more about the technical aspects of worship arts.

Along with the technology and the setup comes the leadership aspect of Worship Arts. "When students audition, they need to be able to perform at a higher level because they have to hit the ground running, and an emotionally secure student is necessary to lead the entire student body in worship," notes Mrs. Engelman. The group engages in deep conversations about the purposes of worship and the idea of viewing the student body as a congregation to be led in worship rather than as an audience to be entertained. "We talk about how it's not about the 'I' but about how our actions are for the Lord with a focus on leading people and how best to lead them." Mrs. Engelman says that this focus has helped the students to look more closely at the lyrics and their meaning, giving them more passion when singing and playing.

When it comes to passion, students in Worship Arts bring it all with them to the stage. "Lena R. is the most sincere person regarding true and deep worship. She exemplifies a strong and silent leader when it comes to giving back to the Lord. She gives from the heart when she sings," shares Mrs. Engelman.

- They were from 3 different breeds of roosters (Buff Orpington, Starlight Green Egger, and Dominique) and a variety of hen breeds/hybrids.
- This was our 3rd time incubating eggs in the classroom and we had our lowest hatching success rate this time (about 50%)
- Chicken eggs are incubated ideally between 99.5 and 100.5 degrees and hatch at
- We candled the eggs twice during the incubation process (1st time at 8 days and
- They begin eating and drinking almost immediately after moving out of the incubator but can stay in the incubator for up to 48 hours post hatching before they are transferred. During this time they begin drying and fluffing up.
- We kept them in a stock tank under a heat lamp for about 3 weeks in our classroom. Then went home and eventually end up in our coops.
- The hens will begin laying eggs at about 5-6 months old.



TEAM. The Mustangs had been practicing and playing at the Omaha Home for Boys (OHB) field since 2015, and the partnership had been mutually beneficial. The team is comprised of players from Concordia, Brownell-Talbot, and Omaha Christian Academy. However, the facilities were no longer meeting the needs of the team, school, and parents. "A discussion began to find a new location with everything we needed: restrooms, bleachers, batting cages, etc. We had struck out multiple times trying to find a great location for our team, so we just let it go," says Moulton.

That year, the team made it to what was the first Class C state baseball tournament to take place in Nebraska. Following the tournament, the team suffered a major loss with the theft of the team gator, PA console, and scoreboard console from the storage shed at OHB field. With the legion season only two weeks away, the team needed to raise over \$6,000 to purchase new equipment. As blessings tend to do, half of the money unexpectedly arrived through one donation, and the Mustangs started the season on time.

In July, Moulton saw an article about Ralston High School's baseball team's move from the historic Orval Smith Memorial Field to

its new diamond. He took a chance and emailed the city, inquiring about the Mustangs' use of the field. By Late August, he had a response from the city of Ralston, and meetings commenced. On October 15, a plan was in place for Mustang Baseball to have a new home at Orval Smith Field.

Moulton's foresight, action, and follow-through brought Mustang baseball to a beautiful new home where foul balls are known as "Free Flying Hot Dogs"! Attendees know that when a foul ball is hit, they are rewarded with a free hot dog for returning it to the concession stand, per the long-standing tradition at Orval Smith Field. Not to be outdone, the Mustangs have brought their own tradition to Ralston with the dancing moms and daughters staking a claim to the deck along the top of the bleachers in front of the press box, newly constructed this season compliments of Maverick Construction and Kay Dee Corporation.

Along with the new deck are stairs to the pressbox, repairs to the bleachers, new concrete and picnic tables, and repairs to the field. "The city has been very accommodating to our Legion Board in immediately investing in facility upgrades, and even investing more as a city. The bottom line, and what I am so grateful for, is that our students who participate in baseball are much better served now," shares Ben Ersland, Concordia Activities Director.
